

## Banjara community in India

Nomadic communities said to have originated from Afghanistan are dispersed in many parts of India. The Banjara community in Jagdishpur is 150 family strong living in mud huts with very little support from the local governments. They support themselves using skills creating beautiful art work and colorful clothing. A distinct community, they have found common roots as followers of Jesus.

They sang songs of Jesus and joined in prayer in the strong name of Jesus when we visited them last October.

From the eldest to the youngest child, they greeted the Yeshu Darbar ministers like David Philips and his colleagues eagerly.



An in-depth analysis was commissioned by uTurn Project in November. Debasis Palit, who was involved in the toilet project in Kalinagar, was sent to conduct a feasibility study. We hope to adopt a project to construct several communal washing, toilets and bathing facilities in partnership with Yeshu Darbar to bless this special community in central UP, India. ### The Canadian dollar vs the donor

As we watch the decline of the Canadian dollar just as this newsletter goes to print, we are grateful that each dollar sent from Canada in 2013 allowed us to achieve a little bit more than we had imagined at the beginning of the year. However cost of goods due to high inflation rate in the Indian sub continent continued to challenge initial budgets for various projects.

We did save money as better processes and innovative designs allowed us to see some tube wells at significantly lower costs than others. Terrain and local re-

sources also dictated outcomes. We embrace every project with careful thought to efficiency of process and sustainability of usage so that every dollar contributed may have long lasting benefits to the communities in need. Thank you for support and contributions over the years. We handle each contribution with a great sense of responsibility and gratitude.

### Jagdishpur Toilet Project

Jagdishpur Village needs three community facilities. Each UNIT will have 20 toilets (8 covered toilets and 8 bathing areas open and not covered for males plus 4 covered bathroom for females). This includes one jet pump, and 8 overhead water storage tanks.

Each UNIT costs CDN 16,000. Three UNITS will cost CDN 48,000. We would like to begin the work on the first unit by March 2014.
